The Middle School Academic Awards Program was held on Tuesday, May 21st, in the Middle School gym. Many students were recognized by their teachers for academic achievements and other accomplishments that were earned throughout the year. This award recognizes academic success in the classroom as each of these 8th grade students maintained a grade of 90% or above throughout the school year and scored in the 85th percentile on a national assessment in math or reading. Each of these students was honored with a letter of congratulations from President Trump, a certificate of achievement and a pin. Erika Cabrales was awarded the 9th annual Woodman American History Award presented by Woodmen of the World to the 8th grader who best demonstrates a passion for American History. Seventh graders Brett Bohling, Sunnie Rother and Jadeyn Grobler qualified for the Duke University Talent Identification Program. Duke TIP works with students, families and educators to identify, recognize, challenge, engage, and help students reach their highest potential. Seventh Grader Kaitlyn Plager and sixth grader Lydia Mejia received recognition for perfect attendance this past school year. Middle School students Kate Beethe, Erika Cabrales, Anzel duPreez, Hayden Huskey, Brandon Speckmann, Aiden Weber, Catherine Blomstedt, Sunnie Rother, Bailey Sterup, Maya Straka, Kayden Badertscher, Gabe Burki, Salena Conley, Alex Cruz, Kali Drake, Juanita Grobler, Keegan Jones, Lydia Mejia and Nolan Wellensiek were recognized for academic excellence for both the 1st and 2nd semester. These students earned a place on the Honor Roll w/ Distinction for both the 1st and 2nd semesters. These were just a few of the students to receive recognition for their academic achievements. Congratulations to all students for the many wonderful accomplishments that were achieved this past school year.

Each student, grades 7-12, who plan to participate in NSAA sponsored activities during the 2019-2020 school year need to turn in a signed Parental Consent form. This must be done before a student is eligible for practice and competition in any activity that is under the jurisdiction of the Nebraska School Activities Association. The participating student and one of his/her parents or guardians must sign the certificate of consent and turn this certificate into the school office. By signing this consent form parents and students acknowledge that they understand there are risks involved in any activity. This parental consent form must be on file at school for every student who participates in NSAA activities.

All 7th grade students, and any student grades 8-12, who expects to participate in athletic contests shall present to the superintendent, principal, or school representative once each year, before actual participation in any interschool sport, a physician's certificate on a form recommended by the NSAA that he/she is physically fit for athletic participation. This physical examination must be given during the school year in which the student participates or during the summer vacation period which precedes the school year in which the individual participates. Also, all incoming 7th graders, freshmen and juniors must complete the ImPact Concussion test to establish a baseline in the event of a head injury. This test will be conducted by school officials and must be done before an athlete is allowed to practice or participate in a contact sport (football, volleyball, basketball, wrestling, jumping events in track & field).

Parental consent forms and physical evaluation forms can be picked up in the office at both sites. Please contact the school if you need either of these forms. All athletes who plan to participate in a fall sport need to take care of this prior to the beginning of fall practice on August 12, 2019. I hope everyone has a safe, enjoyable summer.

Middle School is a critical step in a student's education. It presents new changes and challenges. We hope to help make this a smooth transition with the Fall Walk-Through by allowing students to see their schedules, find their rooms and lockers, and meet with their teachers. This time will also allow the parents to see what is expected of their children in each class regarding homework, lecture notes, deadlines, note taking, etc.

The Fall Walk-Through will begin at 6:00 pm in the commons area where students will receive their 2019 - 2020 schedules as well as forms to be completed. Following a short welcome in the main gym, students and parents will be dismissed to the student's 1st period class. Each period will meet for approximately 5 minutes. During this time teachers will explain their expectations and guidelines for their classes, plus provide an opportunity for parents and students to ask questions. After the last period, forms will be collected in the commons area. All students are expected to come prepared for each class with paper, pencils/erasers, pens, highlighter, Kleenex, etc. **Student Planner/Assignment Books and Handbooks will handed out to all students the first day of school.*

Lunch money will be collected in the commons area following the Walk-Through or students may bring money for lunches the first day of school. All lunches are to be paid in advance. **Free & Reduced lunch applications will be available.*

School physicals are required for ALL students entering the 7th grade and immunizations must be up to date! School physicals are also required for all 8th grade students who are participating in any sport.

YOU'VE BEEN FRAMED

“Nobody will help me.”
 “Everyone is mean to me.”

Both of these are “blanket” statements. A blanket statement is one that attempts to cover everything or everyone. Usually, they are misleading, inaccurate, unfair, misguided or all of the above. From what I’ve experienced, blanket statements are used to frame the listener; to set them up for the big picture to be painted. They are usually used to create a big emotion or a “knee jerk” reaction from the listener.

Here’s an example:

If my wife told me they went to a clothing store and in a sad, desperate voice with tears welling up said “no one” would help them, my emotions can just start running wild as I imagine my wife standing in the crowded, busy store, desperate for help in getting into a changing room with feelings of despair and rejection as workers help all other patrons except my one true love! AAAAAAAAAARRRRRGGGG!! How dare they! Do they know how alone and dejected this makes her feel?! Do they know the long-term damage they are doing to such a frail person?! Or,

have I just been framed by my wife who is only seeking comfort and reassurance after being caught up in the cluttered and busy world of commerce?

Chances are, with blanket statements, the blanket pronoun really means a select person, persons, thing or things. Chances are, the person doing the framing is letting their emotions take control. Sometimes, they just want to hear that they are cared for, accepted and loved. Sometimes, they want affirmation for their feelings. They want someone to agree that their emotions are justified. Anything less than agreement may turn into an all out emotional breakdown. How many times have any of us told a child, or an adult, that everything was going to be “okay” only to hear the irrational response that it won’t be okay or it won’t be all right. This takes us back to some of my previous articles about mindset.

A positive, growth mindset would get us back on track with positive solutions; “I’ll go find a changing room myself” or “I’ll go ask someone else to play”. A negative, closed mindset launches us into despair.

How do we not fall into the trap of being framed? We have to try to keep our emotions in check. We have to try to not take everything personally. These are both hard to do, especially when we are talking about the people we love.

How can we help?

- Reaffirm the way the situation made them feel. Everybody has feelings and emotions. We just have to figure out healthy ways to respond to them.
- Stay calm and think of ways the speaker can solve their own problems. Try to help them take their emotions out of the problem solving process.
- Help the ones we care about not to take on a victim mentality where they feel they have no control over their lives. We do this by helping them to be positive, problem-solvers.

People who frame others emotionally aren’t trying to cause problems, they just want your help.

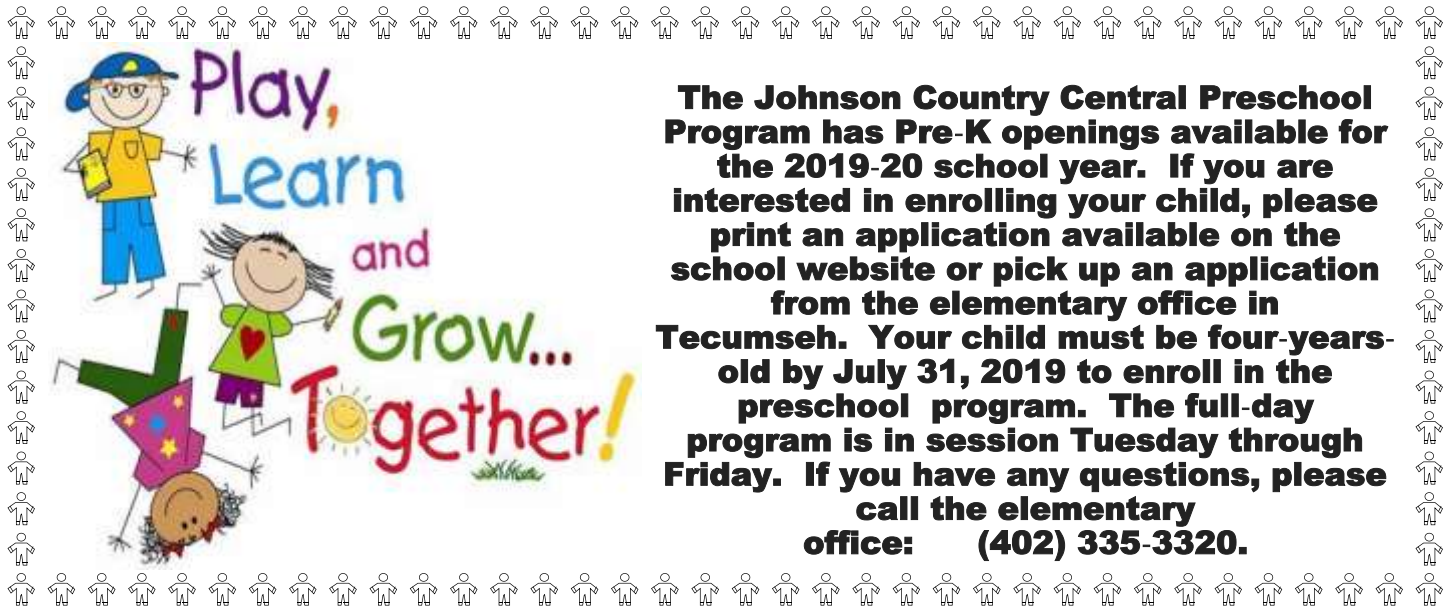

Career Education by Marsha Bacon, K-8 Counselor

Middle School Eighth Grade Class

This school year, JCC 8th grade students have had several opportunities to learn about colleges in Nebraska. They toured campuses at Southeast Community College in Lincoln, the University of Nebraska at Lincoln and Wesleyan University. During the campus visits, students learned how to apply to college, pay for college and the various programs of study offered at each college. They also learned what campus life is like



through the UNL College Access Day and the campus tours. They had opportunities at Wesleyan and SCC to visit with students and classroom educators. All three campus visits were organized through the admissions offices with admission staff teaching students about the application process and how to prepare in High School for their post-secondary school education. The eighth grade class received an EducationQuest Grant to cover the cost of the campus visits.

In addition, this school year the 8th grade students had economic learning opportunities. Students attended a poverty simulation to learn about various aspects of financial literacy provided by SENCA. They also learned about finances and being money wise with Ms. Katie Hupka and Ms. Madison Panko from Mainstreet Bank.



Middle School and Elementary

Elementary students are also participating in career readiness lessons. These same skills have been taught to student's grades K-5. Students learned about the various types of colleges and degrees offered as they prepare for their post-high school careers. They also learned about the colleges JCC staff attended and the degrees staff members earned from those colleges. We made a connection between our careers and the preparation needed to obtain our positions as teachers, counselors, principals and Superintendents. Students had a day in which all teachers shared their story of how they went to college, who helped them, and other information teachers thought might benefit students. Students were able to ask all of their teachers' questions about college, classes and why they thought college was important.

Through the college and career readiness lessons, students learned about personal characteristics that help people become successful and the importance of making good connections with others, particularly adults that work in their area of interest. Students in grades 6-8 utilized a link on the EducationQuest website called "Reality Check." Students were able to use this interactive activity to learn about how much their desired cost of living would be in the real world. It also showed educational paths and careers to support the desired lifestyle of the student. EducationQuest is a free resource to students in Nebraska. 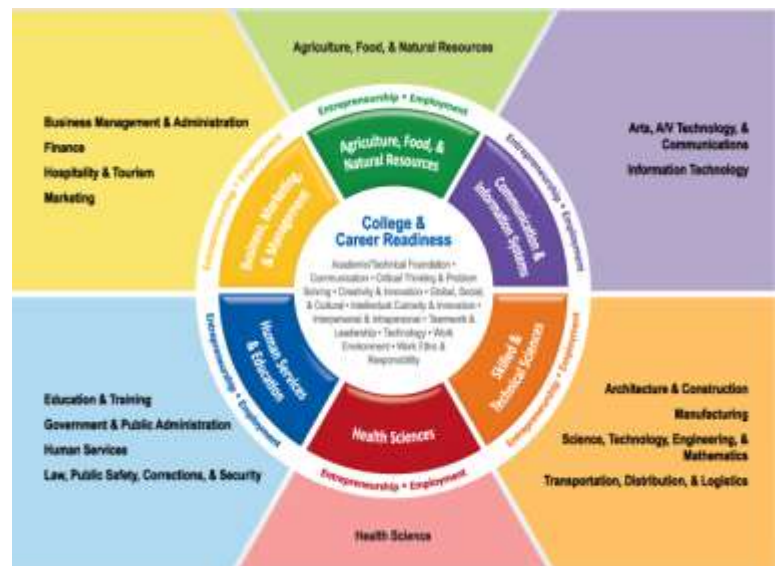

OPPD Demonstrates Electricity 101 to Students in Grades 5-8

On April 30, Omaha Public Power District (OPPD) engineers came to the Cook site to teach students in grades 5-8 about how electricity is generated and used in our communities. Students listened to a presentation from three OPPD engineers who shared with students their educational journey and the benefits of working in the energy field. Upon the conclusion of the electricity 101 presentation, eighth grade students were able to work in groups to learn more about electricity and how it is conducted with electrical kits and a crank generator. The crank generator demonstrated the electricity needed for a standard light bulb vs. an LED light bulb.



Career Day

This year we held our K-5 Career Day on May 16th. Community members working in various field came to school and spoke to our students. It was an exciting day in which students learned a lot about different occupations and career fields. In addition, students were able to dress to reflect the occupation in which they are currently interested or in the gear of a favorite college. Guest Speakers included: Mrs. Kendra Gottula from Tecumseh Family Health, Mrs. Dana Rautenbach from Tecumseh Poultry, Mr. Kenneth Tubbesing from Martin Luther Church, Mr. Matt Pollard from Hausmann Construction and Dr. Galen Boldt Superintendent at Johnson County Central Schools. We also had a guest speaker, Mr. Kevin Kramer, who shared with students his experience with entrepreneurship as he owns and runs a camel farm in Australia. We greatly appreciated the amazing people who came to talk to our students about their career choices. We learned about the skills needed to work in those fields and what skills we could utilize in elementary school to be more prepared for the future. We also discussed the Nebraska Career Clusters and how they aligned with the occupations of our speakers.

Attention students 7th grade & older.

Nebraska School Immunization Requirements:

Tdap (Tetanus, Diphtheria and Pertussis (*whooping cough*)) Vaccine: 1 Dose,

DTaP, DTP DT or Td Vaccine: 3 doses, *one given on or after the 4th birthday*,

Polio Vaccine: 3 doses,

Hepatitis B Vaccine: 3 doses,

MMR (Measles, Mumps, and Rubella), or MMRV (Combination Shot of Measles, Mumps, Rubella & Varicella (Chickenpox) Vaccine: 2 doses, given on or after 12 months of age; separated by at least one month,

Varicella (Chickenpox) or MMRV Vaccine: 2 doses, given on or after 12 months of age;

Written documentation (including year) of Varicella disease from the parent, guardian, or health care provider will be accepted. If the child has had chickenpox, they do not need any Varicella shots.

Shots that are strongly recommended by CDC (Center's for Disease Control):

Menactra/ Menveo; Bexero/Trumemba (Meningitis): 1 dose starting at age 11-15 and/or one dose after 16 years of age. Meningitis is rare but it can be very serious. In as little as 12 hours, meningitis has been known to cause permanent brain damage, limb amputation and death. It is spread by coughing, kissing or sharing drinking glasses. It's not worth the risk.

Are you 16-18 years old? Ask about Bexero or Trumemba.

Gardasil (Human Papillomavirus (HPV)): *(NEW Schedule) 2 doses, 6 months apart; when done *before* age 15. Gardasil is a safe and proven way to *prevent future cancers* caused by HPV infection. Studies have shown there is a better immune response by the body when given at a younger age. This shot can be given as early as age 9 -10 years of age.

Hepatitis A: 2 doses; 6 months apart. Hepatitis A is a contagious liver disease that can range in severity from a mild illness lasting a few weeks, to a severe illness lasting several months. *One* way Hepatitis A can spread, is by eating foods prepared by someone that did not wash their hands well after using the bathroom.

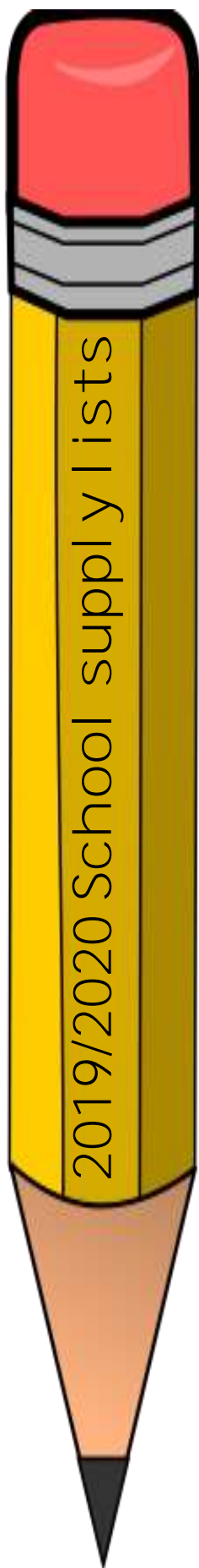

Food That’s In When School Is Out

Johnson County Central Public Schools is working to make sure that no children in our community go hungry when school is closed this summer. Over 50% of children in our District receive free or reduced-price meals during the school year, but many of these children do not get enough to eat when school is out. The Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) ensures that low-income children continue to grow and learn during the summer. **All children ages 18 months to 18 years old are eligible Free Summer Meals. Adults may purchase a meal for \$3.50.**

The Summer Food Service Program, sponsored by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, is the largest federal resource available for local programs that combine meal time with recreational and educational activities.

Johnson County Central Public Schools recognizes the need for the program as “Many of our children who rely on school breakfast and lunch during the school year do not have the energy they need during the summer. That’s where we come in, by providing nutritious meal.

“Our responsibility to kids doesn’t end when school lets out. Kids who get enough to eat and have safe activities to participate in during the summer are less likely to get into trouble. Our summer meals program is a building block in the community for healthy, happy kids who are ready to learn.”

The Summer Food Service Program for Children is a federally funded program operated nationally by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) and administered by a State Agency. Eligible sponsors such as non-profit organizations, schools and local governments serve nutritious meals and snacks free to low-income children during the summer months. Summer programs are located at approved sites that are either in low-income areas or serve a group of children, most of whom are low-income.

Johnson County Central Public Schools will be serving Breakfast 7:30- 8:15 Month of June Only.

Lunch will be served May 28, 29 and 30, June, July and Aug 1. Serving time is 11:30 – 12:30.

Serving Monday through Thursday.

NO Meals on Friday’s or July 4th.

Meals are served in the Johnson County Central High School.
