Pursuing a Facilities Bond

& UNIFYING OUR DISTRICT AT ONE SITE

The Johnson County Central School Board continues to discuss, research, explore and pursue a facilities bond to bring all JCC students, staff and programming to one site, under one roof. Meeting this goal allows us to be more efficient as a school district in budgeting and maximizing the use of staff during the school day.

Of course, a complete PK-12 construction project is expensive and makes for a considerable commitment by the taxpayers of the Johnson County Central School District. However, when considering the financial investment to renovate our current buildings to accommodate all students at one site, new facilities are more financially viable for the long-term future. By this, I mean that our school district would spend millions of dollars renovating and still have old facilities that are “landlocked” at the current site in Tecumseh with little room for expansion.

When conducting public meetings and small group meetings, I receive many questions in addition to facility questions. Some have to do with option-in/option-out students. Some have to do with state test scores. Still others are about the success of JCC’s activities/sports or staffing likes and dislikes. When it comes to a bond vote, we need to be cognizant that we’re not voting for our feelings toward a particular staff member, coach or administrator. We’re not voting on how we feel about the success of the sports teams. We’re not voting for whether or not we feel test scores should be higher. We ARE voting for the future facilities needs of the Johnson County Central School District that will affect us for the next 75+ years.

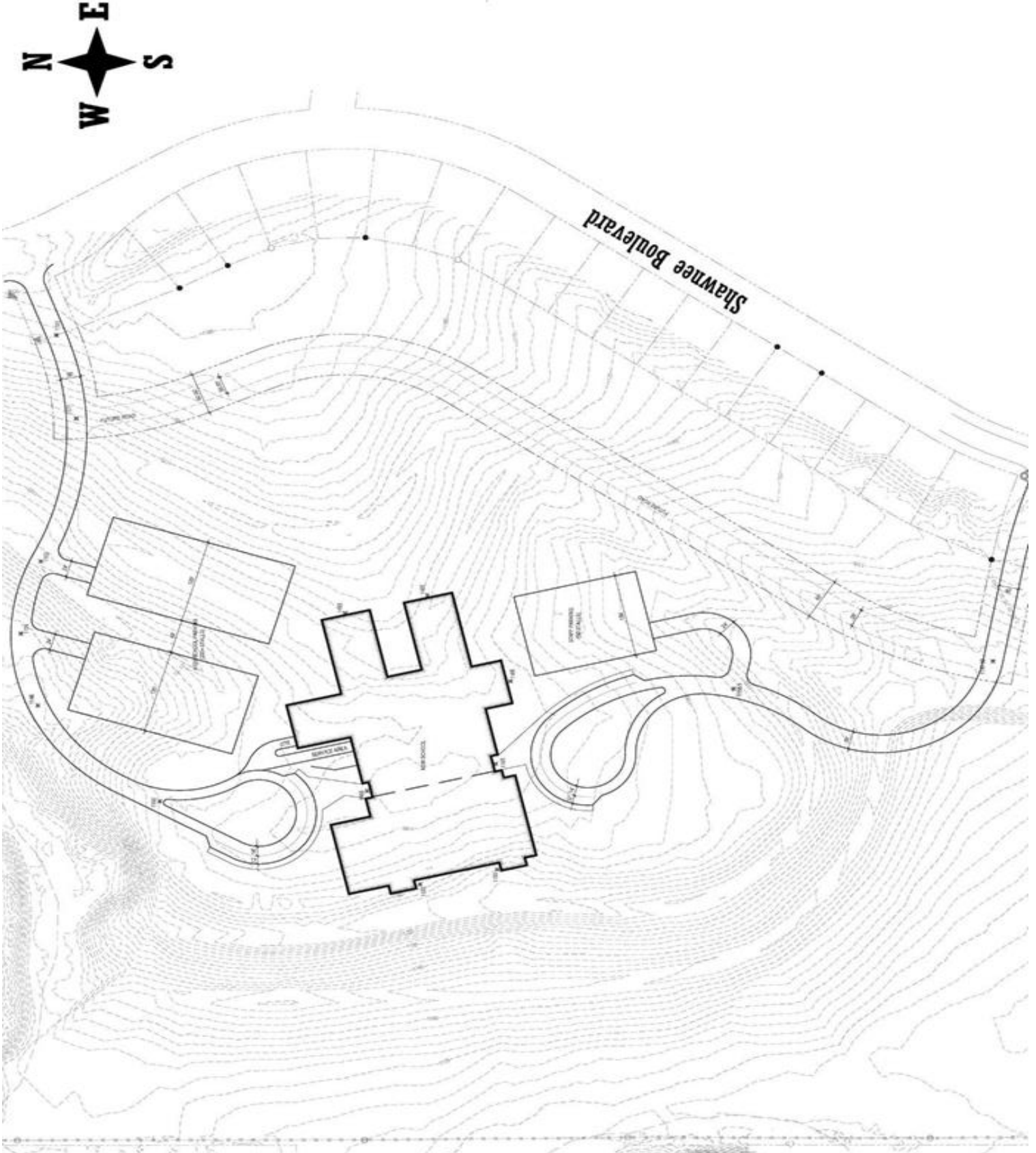

Potential Building Plans & Cost

The images below are current plans for a potential future JCC school on the proposed site (which is approximately 50 acres of farm ground Northeast of the football field at the Tecumseh site). The plans work from East to West on the proposed site with the first (easternmost) image being the highest in elevation. As the building plans move Westward, the elevation drops with each image. Therefore, the building will have three levels; a top level of classrooms, a middle level of classrooms, commons and top load gym, and a lower level being the gym floor and auxiliary gym. The final image is the “site plan” showing how the building will sit on the property.

The goal of the project is to provide the necessary square footage for all the programming needs of our district. Therefore, some of the spaces, walls and formatting could change throughout the design and even building phases. However, the square footage would remain approximately the same. The facility presented here includes ALL programming for JCC’s needs. The current Cook Site, Tecumseh Site Elementary and High School would no longer be needed.

The dollar figure for the facility, all aspects of the work, dirt work, utilities, soft costs and FFE (furniture, fixtures & equipment) is in the range of \$47-\$50 million.

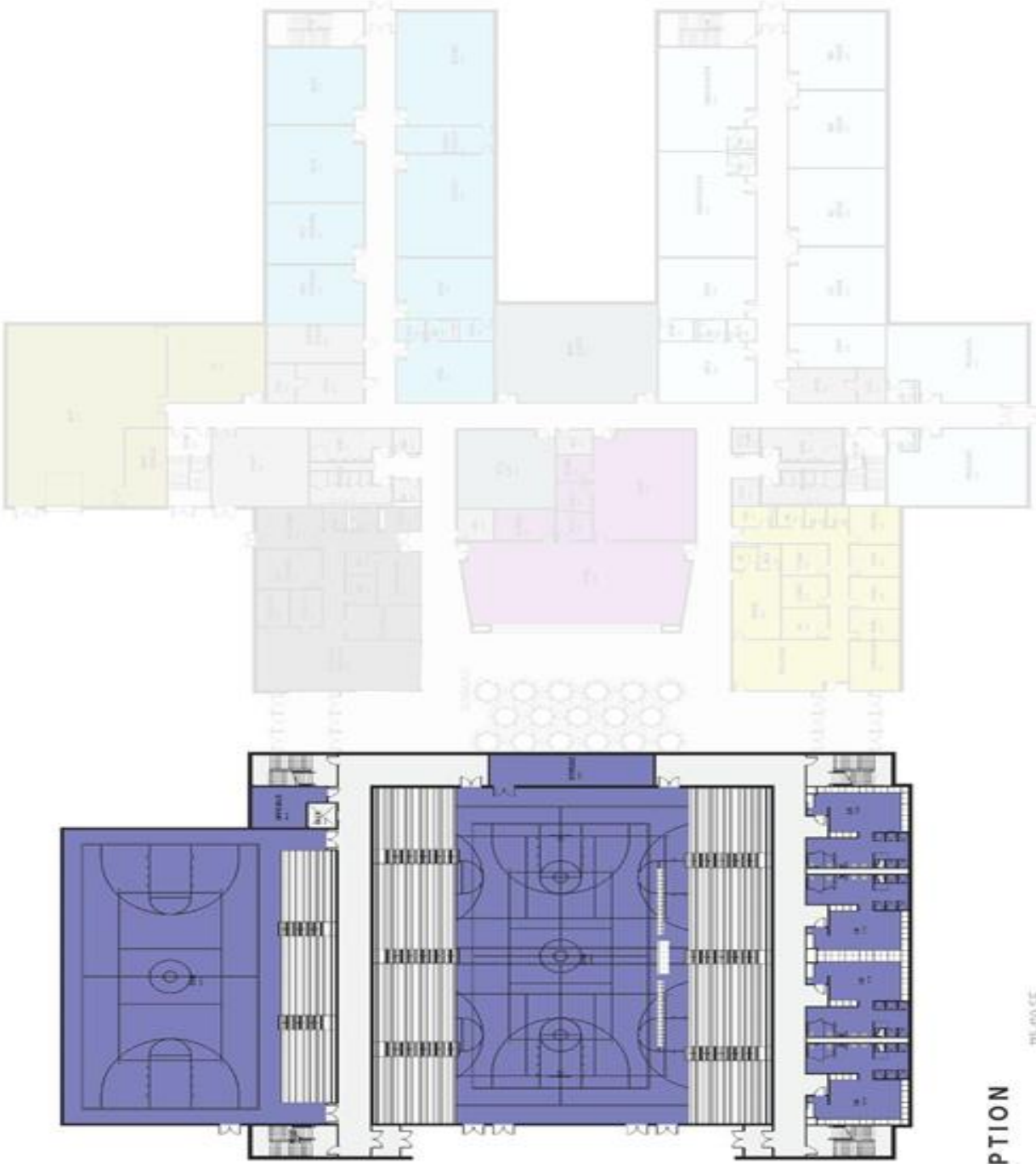

NEWS FROM PRINCIPAL RICK LESTER

Summer vacation is sneaking upon us! For our JCC students, summer means conditioning and working on their preferred sport skills for the upcoming year. Summer is also the time for JCC student's to take advantage of Driver's Education. There is a sign-up sheet at the high school office and middle school office and an informational sheet which explains the qualification for students who want to take Driver's Education. Driver's Education classes will be held from Monday, June 5, 2023 thru Thursday, June 8, 2023 from 9:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. with a thirty-minute lunch. Classes will be held at the high school in room 200. The cost is \$230.00 with payment needed to be made to the school before the beginning of the first class.

In February and March all students pre-registered for the 2023-2024 school year. Once the official class schedule is complete, every student will receive a letter around the first of August which will include their schedule showing their classes and periods. If they like their schedule, nothing needs to be done. If they would like to make changes to their class schedule, they could come to school on Monday, August 7, 2023 anytime from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. or they can make their changes the first five days of school.

Another item that needs to be addressed is our summer school. Summer school is designed for students for credit recovery. Summer school begins Monday, June 5, 2023 and ends on Thursday, June 29, 2023. Classes are from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. Monday thru Thursday. Summer school is administered thru a software program called Odysseyware. Each student will be working independently on the computer. Mrs. Devon Roesener will be monitoring and assisting the class, and be available for questions and help. Each class has a required number of assignments each day (approx. 10-13 assignments) that need to be completed with a passing grade. All required assignments need to be completed by 12:00 p.m. on Thursday, June 29, 2023.

All parents of students who lost credits first semester or who are in jeopardy of losing credits for second semester, will be sent a letter at the end of April explaining this opportunity. I will meet with these students to encourage them to take summer school and the importance of utilizing this program. Summer school needs to be registered and fees paid for before the first day of class on Monday, June 5, 2023. Students may only take summer school to recover 1st or 2nd semester of a class and the fee is \$50.00 per class.

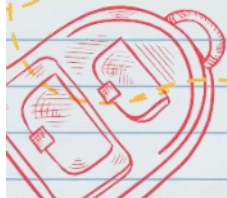
BACK-TO-SCHOOL PHYSICALS

Association of Information Technology Professionals Scholarship- Due June 1st

The Omaha chapter of the Association of Information Technology Professionals, AITP, in partnership with AIM and major financial support from Team Software Chad Nourse Scholarship Fund, is offering several scholarships to help further the education of students who are planning to attend or continuing to attend a college, university, community college, or technical school in Nebraska, Iowa, Missouri, Kansas, North Dakota, or South Dakota, with the goal of achieving an associate's or bachelor's degree in Information Systems, Information Technology, Computer Science, Cybersecurity or a related field. The instructions and application forms are available at www.aitpomaha.org. All applications are due by **June 1, 2023**

ACT Testing- Offered at JCC High School on September 9th and October 28th, 2023

Students will be able to sign up to take the National ACT test at JCC High School on September 22nd if they register on the act.org website by August 4th. They will be able to take the October 28th National ACT test at JCC High School by September 9th. Students create an account on act.org and then register to test. As a part of the registration process, they pick their test site. They should select Johnson County Central High School as their testing site. Students will also need to upload a picture by the designated date on the registration site in order to be fully registered to test. Any student from any school can sign up to test at our school on these Saturday test dates. Most students who take the ACT are high school students, but testing is open to middle schoolers as well. The cost to test is \$66 to take the ACT without writing and \$91 to take the ACT with writing. High school students who are a part of the free and reduced lunch program may ask for a fee waiver from Mrs. Reuter.

Search for Nebraska Scholarships By Using Scholarship Quest

ScholarshipQuest is a feature on the Education Quest website that allows all high school students to create a profile and search for Nebraska scholarships. This is an especially good tool for high school seniors, but there are also scholarships on there for underclassmen as well. If you are in high school, it's a good idea to create an account and check your scholarship matches periodically. 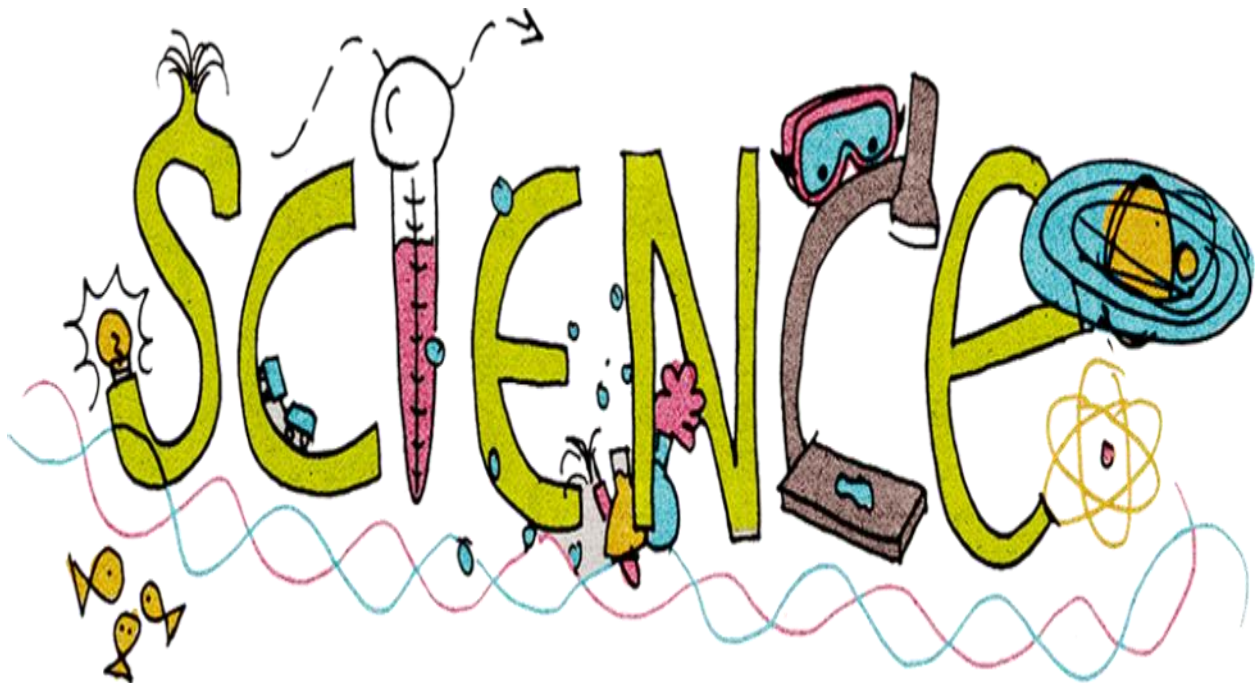
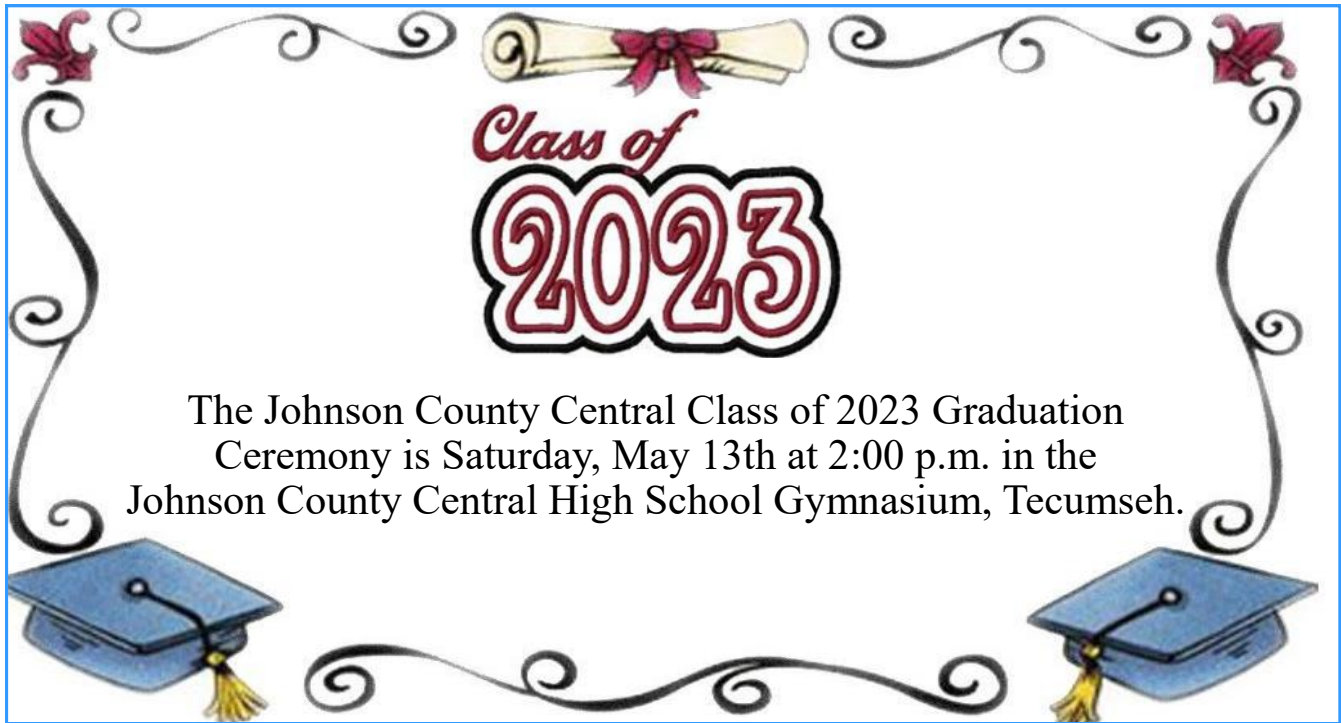

The Nebraska Junior High State Track & Field Meet will be held in Gothenburg on Saturday, May 13th. Hopefully, we will have some of our 7th and 8th grade track athletes qualify for this outstanding event.

Tuesday, May 16 our 8th grade science students will be holding a Science Fair from 9:00-11:00 for our 4th and 5th grades.

The Middle School Honor Assembly (9:00 a.m.) and the 4th & 5th Grade Thunderbird Assembly (10:30 a.m.) will be held on Wednesday, May 17. Students will be recognized for any awards and academic achievements they have earned throughout the year.

As the end of the school year approaches we'll need to turn our attention to the requirements students need to meet before they are allowed to check out for the summer. Student iPads will be turned in during the week of May 15. Students must turn in the school-issued official Apple lightning-to-USB cable and the full 12W charger block. Insurance does not cover lost cables and chargers. If the iPad is damaged and insurance was not purchased (or you have already used your insurance claim), you will be billed the repair cost. If insurance was purchased and it has not already been used, the repair cost will be covered by the insurance. In addition to their iPads, students will also need to have all other school materials (textbooks, library books, athletic uniforms and equipment, padlocks, etc.) turned in, and all bills, fees, and fines must be paid. Any lost or damaged items will need to be paid for. Both their school locker and their gym locker will need to be cleaned out and all personal items must be taken home. Students will not receive their report cards until everything on their checkout sheet has been taken care of. Please have your child check on these items prior to the last day, so he/she doesn't have to make an extra trip back to school to get their checkout sheet signed.

The Industrial Technology students have been busy working in the woods and welding areas with different projects. Most recently students had the opportunity to witness the cutting up of parts of trees into useful pieces of wood for further production.

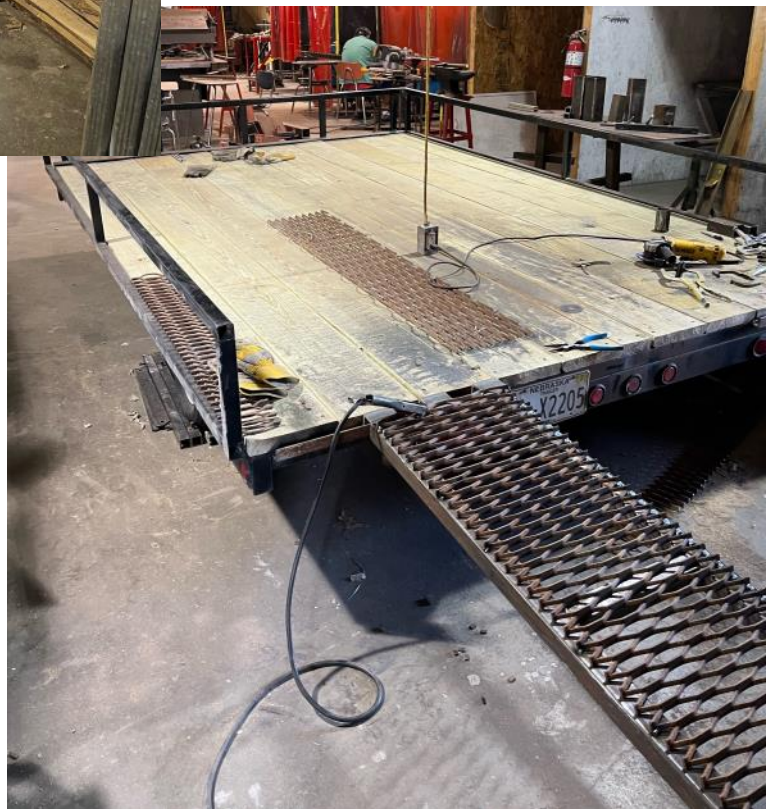
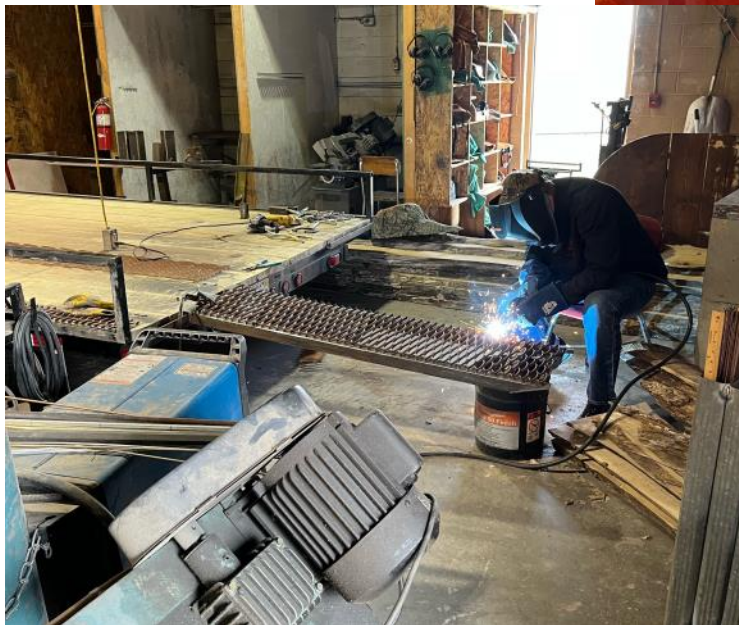
Dan Jones and Andre Rautenbach both took time out of their busy schedules and spent a couple days helping student process a couple parts of a tree, one from the west side of the school which had been removed and the second donated by Mr. Rautenbach. Mr. Jones had placed his mill on the south side of the shop and set it up to process the trees, all in all the students watched Dan mill roughly around 630 board feet of oak. This will be for students to use at a later date after the material has cured properly.

Thanks to the people in the community who are willing to support the students and thank you, administration to allow something of this nature to be a part of the educational process in order for students to take part in just another means of manufacturing process.



Another project that students helped participate in was the revamping of a trailer that the school previously owned and was not real usable.

The students took the time and turned the parade trailer into a very viable trailer for the school.





A third project that students helped participate with was the demolition of a anhydrous tool bar and converted the bar into a large round bale un-roller. I believe that this was a very successful endeavor for the students and the new owner has just recently told me that it works great.



Maintaining the District

This is a greeting from the maintenance/custodial department. As we approach the bond issue coming before us this summer, we have been given the opportunity to inform the public of some of the major projects facing us should the bond fail. Whether a person is personally for or against the vote, he or she should be aware of the projects facing the district in the near future. The three different buildings have their own unique problems that, at this point, are not going to be addressed with simple, inexpensive fixes. We will attempt to list the more important ones to help give an idea of the challenges the district will face in the coming years.

When Larry Naber knew he was going to retire at the end of this year, he started working on a document that encompasses most of these projects. His years of experience and wisdom are already sorely missed and will continue to be so for the foreseeable future. A good portion of the information is what he left to us and was compiled so nicely that it is copied directly from that list. Some of these are possible suggestions on how the projects should be done but all listed are needing to be taken care of in the near future. Thank you Larry for all of your hard work and all you have done for the district.

Concrete: In front of High School : When considering replacing the ramp in front of the high school. Consider sloping the sidewalk from the southwest corner of the building to the entryway elevation. You will need some fill but this would eliminate the ramp as it is right now. You will be able to use the slope of the ground as your ramp. If the windows become an issue, I think that the white part below the window itself is just a false front. Maybe a couple rows of bricks would solve the problem. Slope the fill out to the front sidewalk / circle drive. This will also create a slope on the front and north sidewalks. The sidewalk going from the building to the front needs to be replaced anyway. Thus creating ADA access from any direction. You have plenty of dirt, over east to haul for the fill. The sidewalk around the roof area could be designed so as to allow the benches to be reinstalled.

North Entrance to High School : This area could be sloped from the bottom of the doors out to the parking area as long as you maintain a slope away from the building. This also would create ADA access to the north doors, as this is where the chair lift is located to gain access to all three floors. Again if you are staying in this building for an extended period of time consider a double door entry for this door before you slope the sidewalk.

In front of Grade School : All of the sidewalks in front of the Elementary need to be replaced.

West of the mower shed : There is an area west of the mower shed that is broken up. This should be replaced as it is allowing water under the concrete and down to the west side of the boiler room. This is also a tripping hazard for people walking in the area.

Stadium Area: There are several areas that need to be replaced.

Curbs at Cook Site : Curbs in front of the building need to be replaced.

Boiler Room : The large water storage tank in the south room should be removed. At the very least it should be completely disconnected from the water supply. It was left connected to the hot water system because it was thought that we may need it in the future. This tank has to have stagnant water in it. If this water ever made access to the potable water we would have serious problems. Also improved lighting in the boiler room would help.

Bus Barn Roof : The roof needs to be replaced. I believe that building was built in the late 60's early 70's. If a new roof isn't put on soon the wood underneath will rot to the point that it will need to be replaced also. Some of it already is to that point. This building owes the district nothing, for its age and purchase price it has more than paid for itself. It just needs some upkeep.

The big doors need repair. Some of the shiplap has rotted and needs to be replaced and painted. New handles and locks also. Top rollers need some attention also.

Also maybe consider purchasing the property to the south and build on to the bus barn. It doesn't have to be anything fancy, just an open sided pole shed. Something to keep the buses out of the weather. If you have made the investment in a new bus I wouldn't think that you would not want to leave it out in the weather to deteriorate.

Another option is to add a stall to the north and/or the south side of the existing building. If you went on the south it could be extended to the west so 2 buses could fit, one in front of the other. It would take a little fill dirt but again there is plenty of dirt east of the high school. This may not be a bad idea as the dock area takes up a fair space that could be used for parking of a second bus, especially the shorter route buses. Maybe with some planning and thought this could be worked out.

Also consider updating the restroom in the bus barn.

Stone Tree Rings : Consider removing the stone rings around the small trees in front of the buildings. This would help with mowing / trimming.

Mower Shed : The overhead doors are worn out and should be replaced.

Door Locks: All classroom door handles and locks need to be replaced. This includes all classroom doors, closets, cabinets (cafeteria). If staying at the Cook site for an extended period of time consider replacing the locks here also. The Cook site has two different master keys depending what part of the building you are in.

Closed Loop Heating System : The electric motors for the pumps should be serviced and possibly rebuilt or replaced. Pump no.1 has 12,087 hrs. Since July 8th 2020. It could have more hours but this is the last time the time was reset. Pump no. 2 has 1858 hrs since July 8th 2020. Again this could have more hours also. The Pumps themselves should be rebuilt with new seals, bearings etc. This should be done during the summer when they are not in use. Also a drain valve and drain pipe should be installed on the makeup tank for this system. Again this summer when it is not in use. This is the system that supplies heat to the majority of the classrooms.

Air Conditioning: Classroom units are using R22 freon. This is being phased out and is very expensive and soon will be impossible to obtain. Consider replacing the whole unit and not just repairs. Repairs are just kicking the can down the road and replacement is inevitable. Consider cooling the hallways. This will reduce the stress on the room units as they try to cool the hallway when the doors are open. When replacing these units, consider going to a heat pump style heating/cooling system. This would eliminate the closed loop heating system in place now. Thus eliminating the broken coils that have happened in the classrooms. Of course this will hinge a lot with the bond vote.

HVAC Control program: Update the control program for the HVAC system. Get control of the boilers and the Boiler Room. We had control of this area with the old boilers but when the new boilers were installed the wiring was removed and never reinstalled. We need control of the outside air dampers so we know when and if they are working. They are running in what is known as survival mode, factory settings. We need to have control over lead / lag , alternating when the boilers run so one does not run all the time and the other just sits there. Plus other things. I believe the current program is 2002. The program was developed to run on Windows 7. How many programs that were designed to run on Windows 7 are compatible to run with the programs that we run today? We have issues with room controls, especially at the Tecumseh site. When you change a setting or something you should be able to see the change as it happens, but you can't. You have to go out of the program to the start window and go back in to see if the change took effect. The Cook site does what it is supposed to, the Tecumseh site doesn't. There are programs that will send alert text messages for changes in different things, like temperatures. This maybe could have prevented the frozen pipes in the boiler room.

Air Handlers in High School : The Actuator on the steam valve, on the south gym air handler needs repair. It could be a wiring problem or a programming problem. I believe that the actuator itself has been replaced but doesn't seem to respond to commands.

Ventilation: In the weight room area put in a possible direct vent to the outside. Control it with a limit switch. Also improve ventilation in the locker rooms and restrooms. When the remodel was done and a false ceiling was put in the ventilation was not properly installed. It was left to run wild above the false ceiling. Maybe a larger capacity exhaust fan on the roof would help.

Entry Doors: The South set of doors on the high school have fallen off once already. The overall condition of the three sets is not good, they are worn out, and / or broken. They are nowhere close to being energy efficient.

The double doors in room HS104 (Art Room) should be replaced with a more secure set of doors. The doors get opened for different reasons and they do not close properly becoming a security/ safety issue. This door uses a manual pin style locking system.

The double doors going outside by the weight room should be replaced with a more secure set of doors. This set of doors also use a manual pin style locking system. This door has an electronic lock on it but is frequently propped open for extended periods of time. I think the reason for it being open is for ventilation as the Weight Room is not air conditioned. This becomes a security/safety issue as well as allowing warm moist air in the lower floor of the building thus making the AC work harder to cool for the classrooms.

The 2 entry doors on the east side, and the one on the south side of the welding shop should have new hardware if not the doors completely replaced. The panic bars are dated and worn out on all three doors. The set of double doors out of the Industrial Arts classroom should have the hardware replaced if not the whole door. Also not very secure.

The north entry doors of the high school, all 3 sets, need to be controlled by electronic locks, so they cannot be manually tripped to be kept open. People do this when they go to the parking lot so they can get back in. The problem is they don't reset the doors and they remain open thus causing a security issue. With acts of violence becoming more commonplace in a school setting this is something that could be done to help prevent that from happening.

Communication Devices : A P.A. system that can be heard and understood in the entire building. Restrooms, hallways and exterior/Playground area.

Main Sewer Line High School : When a camera was placed in the main line it was noted that there are several bends in this line. Consider replacing this, especially if the concrete sidewalks going over top are going to be replaced. At least consider having a camera placed in the line just to make sure. You don't want to do a sidewalk project over top and soon after dig it up to replace a sewer.

Domestic water: Domestic water pressure needs to be increased in the restrooms and Kitchen. Maybe replace the Main Domestic Water valve for the high school building. This may solve the pressure problem as the valve does not close all the way so it may not be opening all the way either. Keep in mind that a main water line is in place from the city main to the mechanical room in the southeast corner of the building for the future fire sprinkler system in the high school (which there is not one.)

Lower Level Restrooms: Both Boys and Girls restrooms need the partitions replaced soon. Update the flush valves on the urinals and toilets. Some of these, I think, are original fixtures. Sinks and mirrors have already been replaced. Lighting has been updated. New ceiling tile would finish the project.

Both Science Rooms: Update all plumbing. Both supply and waste. This would consist of replacing the waste trap under the sinks. Replacing the supply lines to the sinks and making sure that the faucets work correctly or replacing them with all new faucets, again some of these could be original fixtures.

Horizon Rm. 100 : Update the plumbing. Both supply and waste. This would consist of replacing the waste trap under the sinks. Replacing the supply lines to the sinks and making sure that the faucets work correctly. There is a garbage disposal under the south sink. I don't believe that it is currently used, I don't even know if it is operational. Maybe remove it and return to a normal drain.

South Room of the Old Library high school : Update all plumbing. Both supply and waste. This would consist of replacing the waste trap under the sinks. This could eliminate future problems as I believe this is original fixtures.

Chair Lift in High School: This will need to be updated before long. Just something to keep in mind.

South Entryway H.S.: Support poles need to be replaced, SOON.. Maybe at this time it should be considered to enclose the area for a double door entry system and before a possible concrete project for sidewalks. This also is true for the front door, consider a double entry way before a new sidewalk / ramp project.

Exterior Security lights : Consider replacing the old style security lights with LED lights like on the front of the Elementary Building. This will help with lighting on the north side of the building and parking area as well as the sidewalks in front of the school. There are currently no operational lights behind the high school building and shop area. New lighting behind the building would help for Football games. Consider putting a light above the Boiler Room door. It is really dark going down the steps and over to the door.

Concession Stand : This needs some drywall work and cabinets replaced. This could be an Industrial Arts project. **Exterior Lights** Consider replacing the old style Metal Halide lights with LED fixtures. This would improve lighting for Football games as well as security for the area.

Cook Site

Heater in the old Gym: The north one is shot , the south one is still running but barely. Both units need to be replaced. Consider cooling the old gym and what is currently the rooms of Mr. Dierking, Mrs. Dorsey, Mrs. Crotty, Mrs. Phillips, Mrs. Robison and the kitchen with one unit. This would eliminate the window style AC units in the classrooms.

Plumbing: Update the plumbing in the kitchen both supply and waste. There are washing machine hoses connecting wall piping to sink faucets. Also consider updating the supply and waste in the old classrooms that have them. I believe these to be original fixtures. Drain lines should be cleared while you have it apart. Install a toilet and/or a urinal in the boys locker room by the old gym. There isn't any toilet in this locker room (He was being modest. The entire kitchen needs to be redone.)

New Roof: (Larry did not have a chance to write out any information about the roof in Cook. The roof leaks in multiple places; the middle school bathrooms, the commons area, Mrs. Crotty's room, etc. These are not places where simple patches can be made. The roof needs to be replaced.)

Door Locks: Update classroom door locks. Consider putting electronic locks on other entry doors; (main entrance by north gym). Also put monitoring devices on all Entrance/Exit doors to monitor when they are open and for how long.

LED. Lighting: Install LED lights in Both Gyms. Install LED lighting through building

Concrete repair: Curb/Gutter work in front of building.

HVAC : Consider replacing the pneumatic controlled heating valves with electronic controls and thermostats. Do away with the pneumatic system completely. This is an area from the main entrance south to the new addition. This would affect the heating only.

Soffits: (The soffits on the old part of the Cook building need to be replaced.)

Tecumseh Elem.

All of the topics mentioned below are based on the passage of a bond issue.

Lighting: Consider new LED lights in all classrooms and the Gym. Install better lighting in the north stairwell going from Mrs. Doedens room to the northeast exit door by the library.

Library Floor: The wood under the tile covered floor in the Library is completely riddled with termites. The whole floor needs to be replaced.

HVAC System: This building is in no better shape than the High School or the Cook site. The individual room units use R22 refrigerants. This is extremely costly and will be phased out completely in the near future. These units have served their time and owe the district nothing. If replacing these units you will have to use heat pumps as this is the only heating source for the classrooms as the steam heat was removed when the AC units were installed. Also consider installing an exhaust fan in the restrooms. These were left out of the remodel.

The large rooftop AC unit for the auditorium seating (west unit) is shot. It needs to be replaced. The east unit is a new unit, replaced within the past 5 years. It needs some help with the air circulation. This comes out above the gym in the round diffusers. I don't think this has worked right since it was put in.

This building also uses steam for heating in some locations (hallways and basement). There have already been problems with the condensate return lines rusting out. This will continue to happen. The radiators in the hallways should be dismantled and cleaned with new steam traps installed along with new control valves. Even if staying in this building longer than 2 more years, replacing the traps and control valves would affect the operation of these units in a positive manner. Making them more efficient and easier to control.

Windows and Doors: All windows and exterior doors need to be replaced. The windows have settled through time and do not operate properly. The North Door is completely messed up. Frame is bent, the panic bar is worn out. There is a drainage issue with this doorway. The outside is about 2 inches higher than the inside floor. Water flows in the building from the outside as the concrete slopes towards the building. If the drainage problem is going to be fixed by sloping the concrete away from the building that should be done before replacing the door as it will change the size of the door.

The east (back door) frame has settled and does not allow the door to close properly.

Sewer and Water : If you stay in this building for any extended period of time consideration should be given to updating the supply water lines, both hot and cold water. Not only to the restrooms but the drinking fountains. Consider relocating shutoff valves to be installed in a more accessible area besides under the building below the restrooms. I believe that these pipes are the old galvanized pipes, probably original, and are probably restricted thus causing the pressure issue. Also consider replacing all of the waste lines this includes the mop sinks.

Larry saw much of what is coming down the road for the maintenance of these sites. He knew the state of the buildings at the Tecumseh site better than anyone else in the district. He was not finished working on this document and there was more to be added.

Some of these smaller items we continue to work on but some of these are major repairs and will be big financial hits to the district and we think the taxpayers should know what is coming down the road for these buildings whether the bond passes or fails.

Building Bridges in First Grade

At Christmas time the PTO puts up Christmas trees in our hallways and asks our teachers to write down some resources that we can use in our classrooms. Over the past 2 Christmases I wrote that I could use some building materials for my classroom. These are great to have on hand in case of inclement weather and inside recesses, but I really wanted them for a project linking to a story we read in our reading textbooks.

The story is called, "Building Bridges". It is a nonfiction story about different kinds of bridges found in different places around the world. It is so interesting. We learn about a cable-stayed bridge in Florida called the Sunshine Skyway Bridge and how those cables hold the bridge up. We read about a 2000 year old arch bridge in Italy made of bricks. We also discuss a truss bridge called The Firth of Forth Bridge in Scotland and how the triangles support the railway. We are fascinated by the Golden Gate suspension bridge in California and how it is painted a bright orange color so that it stands out in the fog. But the one bridge we find the most interesting is a one-of-a-kind bridge in London known as the Rolling Bridge. This bridge rises up and curls into a circle so that boats can pass.

For a homework assignment, the students were given a paper with a river drawn down the middle of it. They had to draw their home on one side and the school on the other side. Then they drew a bridge over that river that connected their home to the school. In the classroom they wrote about the kind of bridge they drew, what it was made of, and if a boat could or couldn't go under their bridge and down the river. Each bridge was unique.

Once finished with the writing, the building materials came out and students were able to go from one set of materials to another and build bridges and other structures. Students were able to see how the proper materials were needed - shapes, sizes, flat surfaces - to build and support their structures. Here are a few photos to show our learning time.
